With nearly 3,300 students here at Herriman High School, many of us have become accustomed to shoving our way through the crowded hallways hoping to get to class on time. According to CNN White House Reporter, Stephen Collinson, "if the government shutdown lasts much longer, President Donald Trump's only way out Act, a law that addresses issues if the may involve a choice between two pillars of his political viability -- his border wall and his purring economy." But it's unrealistic to think that things will go back to normal in a day, there will be weeks of catch up to do when everything returns, cleaning up, and rehiring to compensate the chaos.

background needed:

In Congress, they pass bills that allow the federal departments (e.g. The National Park Service, Homeland Security, Treasury, and NASA) to spend funds to their individual needs, these bills are renewed after a period of time (lasting for a few weeks to years). And once they expire Congress can pass another funding bill for them so everything continues to keep working.

However, a government shutdown is the prod uct of Congress discontinuing the bills for a time. Usually, this happens when there is a disagreement that is big enough to cause everything to stop. Shutdowns can continue for however long until the president or congress folds due to either pressure or the outweighing political cost.

The 2019 government shutdown is the outcome of Trump wanting to fund Border Security and the Democratic party declining the proposition. The escalation started when President Trump, as famously known for saying at his presidential announcement speech, "I would build a great wall, and nobody builds walls better than me, believe me, and I'll build them very inexpensively. I will build a great, great wall on our southern border and I'll have Mexico pay for that wall."

So, how does that affect us all the way in Herriman High? Applying for federal financial aid (FAFSA) has gotten a lot harder, if you need to send in your family's income tax transcript, you'll have to get it from the Internal Revenue Service (The IRS) to which that department is shut down. With deadlines quickly approaching students do need that information so they can attend college.

Not only that, if your parents work for the government they're at risk to work with no pay. Government vendors or contractors (an estimated 4.1 million people) could be left without being paid at all. Currently, government workers are paid bi-weekly, which means most workers have gone without their paychecks.

Our state does pay for most of its own affairs, but National Parks like Zion or Bryce Canyon, are unfunded. Not to mention reports rolling in about local devastations to the area due to understaffing, which is letting the environment suffer from it all.

For airports, many of their TSA workers have called in sick days or have quit avoiding working without pay, letting lines backed Something needs to happen, and it needs to happen soon.

EDIT: The shutdown concluded on January 25th when President Trump concluded the the government will reopen for a small time after 35 stressful days for everyone. Relief and more conflict arise with this as the IRS are an estimated 1 whole year behind on taxes, government workers will be compensated for their work, all the while the departments will open back up. However, the border security funding was not passed leaving many to wonder what will President Trump's next move be in order to complete his promise?

Although this seems like a waste of time to some, another classmate finds the discussion helpful. It's no question the students at Herriman High have mixed emotions when it comes to Thrive. A common opinion amongst students is that, Do although Thrive comes from a genuine place, it easily appears superficial. With programs designed to potentially aid the student body, significance lies in taking into account reactions of the targeted audience.

MAP has always been a useful time for students to make up work and finish assignments. For high school students with busy schedules, MAP is a useful time they look forward to. Junior Kourtney Olsen explains, "Personally I feel like I thrive more when I can use MAP time to fix my grades." Beyond studies, many see MAP time as a social opportunity to spend time with their friends. Some students find that the push for authentic connection conflicts with MAP time because it's being used to view a presentation. Perhaps if Thrive presentations begin to carry a more genuine connotation, student participation will go up.

However, a potential solution could lie solely in the attitude of the students here at Herriman. Casey Pehrson, school psychologist here at Herriman says, "There is a lot of power in positivity... When you kind of apply some of these concepts and principles in your life, every other area of your life improves... it's kind of like building a foundation that everything else can thrive upon and build upon."

Pehrson suggests, "My advice to people who hate it... don't knock it 'till you try it." If you find yourself having a bad experience with this new program, try your best to apply the concepts to your life and remember that the program should be a reminder of how much the school cares for its students.

As far as student engagement goes, if Thrive presentations could turn into more of Thrive discussions, maybe students would be more involved. The moment an audience becomes disinterested in something mandatory, the appropriate reaction is to find out why and evolve the activity to be more fitting. A lot of students are looking for help, but also more freedom with how that help is delivered to them. "I think Thrive should be optional... I understand that it could be beneficial, but not to everybody," says Herriman student, Hannah Tycksen.

Whether it's a book they're assigned to report on or an event they have no choice but to attend, teenagers are prone to despise anything they cannot choose to do. Although it may not highly improve the attitude students have towards the Thrive program, there's a possibility more Mustangs would be open to the idea of it if they had the choice to be present. However, any help Herriman High students are given is highly appreciated and does not go unnoticed. "I personally appreciate the messages. However, many students appear to have negative attitudes about it. I don't think that will change."

How the government shutdown affects national parks

As I'm writing this article, the government has been partially shut down for 27 days. Although there are multiple areas that the government shutdown is currently impacting, my focus is on how it has affected the national parks. Yosemite and yellowstone for example, have been closed for the partial shutdown. They are still open to visit, but there are no workers or employees to clean and care for the land. The results of this abandonment are devastating.

One of the most notable detriments are the trash cans. No one is there to take out the garbage, so currently it is overflowing out of the cans. Littering is a terrible thing to do, but at this point it's the only way to get rid of your trash. On a worse note, National Geographic mentions how multiple pit toilets have been overfilled, causing Joshua Tree national park campsites to close. It also mentions how the NPCA has found human feces on the actual roads and elsewhere.

The Joshua Tree park superintendent, David Smith, details how the park has been mistreated in an article from the national parks traveler. Chains and fenced off areas have been broken into so that off roading vehicles can enter. Joshua trees were actually cut down to make new roads. According to CNN, the notable trees have been considered to be put on the endangered species list which poses a hazardous threat towards their survival. However, one of the worst impacts the shutdown has affected is on small business.

A lot of the small businesses near the national parks have been struggling. Since the park is closed, no customers are coming. Many workers are worried about how they are going to pay their bills. In an article by Think Progress, a small business owner detailed how it has affected his income. Two Sides of the Flag

A conversation between people and self.

"That's gay," a phrase that's commonly flung around the halls; sometimes as a joke, maybe even as an insult. No matter, let's address the elephant in the room, in a world that is constantly progressing and reverting to tradition how is the rising topic of LGBTQ and straight communities affecting us, if at all, here at Herriman and what people have to say about it.

In today's world you will probably know someone who is apart of the queer community, in 2016 a study from the US Centers of Disease Control (CDC) conducted a survey called The Youth Risk Behavior Survey and one of the questions they asked high school students is how they identify themselves. Turns out 1.3 million kids, or roughly 8% of all high school students in America, report being lesbian, gay, or bisexual.

Herriman obviously is no different, having clubs like the Gay-Straight Alliance (GSA) and a variety of students with opinions it's important to try and understand their thought process to promote a conversation. Students from around the school were interviewed from both sides about what they thought about the situation and its entirety as followed:

What is your opinion of the environment towards LGBT here are Herriman?

The overall student body opinion aligned with one another as it was unanimously agreed on most topics. Andrew Stuart sums it up as, "extremely nice...and supportive, while others can be not so friendly." While others such as Bella Nielsen, a student said, "I think that it could be better cause there's still a lot of jokes about them and using gay as an insult which I think isn't okay."

When asked to explain she said, "I think because of the difference in sexuality. Obviously, being heterosexual is the norm, especially in Utah, and because some people don't understand the different attraction they're scared or just don't like it and decide to disrespect it." Which is a shared opinion that ignorance and lack of understanding



made up most of the conflicts.

Several others mentioned a lot had to do with religion and faith, as the prominent LDS church does recognize homosexuality but their thoughts are understandably unchanged. It is important to note when speaking to many of the interviewees when the mention of religion came up many spoke in hushed voices to avoid outside ears or wouldn't touch the subject.

As clubs like the GSA are available and meetings are held after school on Thursdays, I interviewed one of the members about how they thought about the club,"...the same people hang out together, some are left out, but it is nice to hang out and know you have support from the other members." But again, everyone agreed that it was a good idea to have a grouped community to turn to especially when there aren't many people to get help from.

Especially in school where everything is pretty set in the system, we don't learn much outside of male-female relationships, up until 2016 there was a law in Utah called "no promo homo law" which prohibited positive promotions of LGBT which it was recently revoked.

Adding more perspectives means more learning which sounds extreme as many would think of forcing everyone to sit and listen about sunshine and rainbows. However, simply acknowledging the possibility of someone in the crowd not being straight will help both sides understand that there is nothing different from one another.

When asked for solutions for the problem both sides agree beating down ignorance was a good way to start. Savannah Singleton mentioned, "-it doesn't really need to be a topic in school. It'd be cool if we could learn about the uprising and the protests of trying to get our rights. Maybe that'll fight our ignorance."

With that said, understanding that we should respect one another, sexuality is just like any aspect of life. Whether you're straight or queer we are all people, and maybe learning about one another will not only help our understanding but work for a more equal and supportive community that isn't based on malicious judgment. Start a conversation and maybe you'll learn more about yourself.

Herriman High School Programs Thrive through Fair and Equitable Fund Distribution

Despite educational funding crisis nationwide, Herriman's budget never wavers STORY BY: BEN MOORE

Public education is one of the most under-funded industries in the United States. Teaching is not a profession in which one will make a lot of money, and is often a thankless job. Beyond the issue of teacher salaries, there are many UHSAA sanctioned activities that need to be funded, many of which Herriman High School students participate in. I decided to interview Principal Todd Quarnberg to see how the school receives most of its funding and how that funding is distributed.

Upon sitting down with Mr Q, I asked him how the school receives most of its funding. He replied that "The bulk of our funding comes from the State of Utah. Everybody thinks the federal government is doing a lot of funding for education and in truth, that is not true. There are some funds that come from the government, the federal government, like in ESSA funding." He guessed that "10-12% of our funding comes

from the federal government, the rest is state." He said that state property tax accounts for a large portion of funding for education in Utah.

Even with the money that comes from taxes, it would take a vast amount of funding for the school to support all extra curricular programs on its own. Some states have the lottery to help fund schools, but that is illegal in Utah. You can't even

sell a raffle ticket without attaching something like a piece of candy along with it. Raising taxes is one option. However, there was a recent proposition in the last state election, which called for a tax on gas to fund schools. The proposition was resoundingly defeated. Principal Quarnberg

said that he doesn't want to "burden our community" with any more taxes. He says that "it's important that the way I distribute funds is fair and equitable. We need to satisfy the needs with what we've got." Some at Herriman High would say the way funds are distributed is not fair and equitable. Furthermore, they would say the administration greatly favors sports when deciding how to cut the pieces of the pie. Mr Quarnberg would beg to differ. "My job is to make sure that the student body is not the have nots, that they feel like they're being supported by this school," states Q. "I always hear the accusation, "well he's gonna fund sports, all he cares about it sports. If they could really look at the budget they would see that the majority of the money would be spent in performing arts."

In contrast, athletics actually brings in more revenue than any other family of programs in the whole school. Along with tickets from football games, Herriman high has signed a sole source agreement with BSN sports "that we will buy our apparel from them," said Principal Quarnberg. "We are pulling in thousands of dollars in that contract. For everything we purchase for BSN, there's a kickback, and that's how we fund (other programs)."

In conclusion, education needs more funding. Where it should come from, no one knows. Even though raising taxes seems like a great idea to many, recent state initiatives have shown that the general population is not content with paying more taxes to fund their schools. However, through great planning and budgeting, like that at Herriman High, school programs can thrive. With more funding, these programs could take off, providing many more opportunities to students for generations to come.

SAGE testing: two words that elicit a groan from students and teachers alike. Everyone remembers testing day, when half of the class would log onto computers and stare at them for a couple hours, while the other half who opted out would fall asleep. In 2017, there was an overall dip in SAGE scores all across the board. Every grade level showed a decline in scores in every subject. 2017 was also the year with the most opt-outs.

SAGE stands for Student Assessment of Growth and Excellence. It's a comprehensive, state law required assessment system that was developed and implemented in Utah. SAGE tests a student's knowledge in math, science, and English Language Arts. This test is meant to not only measure what a student has learned, but also how well the teacher taught it. Unfortunately, many students don't take it seriously.

However, SAGE has been replaced by something new. The Utah State Board of Education plans to dive into the 2018-19 school year with a new testing contract. The American Institutes for Research (AIR) has been replaced with a new testing vendor after their contract expired. Questar Assessment Inc., based in Minnesota, has taken the stage in a \$41.5 million, five-year contract. Grades three

through eight will buckle down with Questar's adaptive test, RISE, this year, while 9th and 10th graders look towards a different kind of assessment. A new contract with Pearson adopts the Utah Aspire test, an amalgamation between the ACT and standard freshmen and sophomore testing questions.

Although these required tests are meant to evaluate and rank students, the students themselves don't take the test seriously. How are they going to collect pure, untainted data when students fill in bubbles at random and fall asleep during the test? It's an evaluation of their best work, not their laziest. Students see SAGE as filler, an excuse to skip their lesson for the day. Sophomore, Hayley Arnold expresses an opinion shared by many students when she says, "SAGE testing is stupid and pointless. Every time I took it, I never tried. I just clicked answers." She asks, "It doesn't affect me, so what's the point?" However, Hunter Nordberg argues that SAGE testing "shows you know the material and it helps teachers."

Standardized testing has always been risky. To the education system, students are seen as test scores. Utah schools are using this standardized testing to define and compare students. However, no student is the same, and no student will react the same to their testing environment. Especially when the SAGE test is seen as a student learning objective (SLO) instead of a final. This harms the teacher, making them look bad as scores continue to drop lower and lower. It also harms the students, planting and watering a seed of grudge towards testing. Teacher's cries to take the test seriously go unheard by students who only want to finish quickly so they can go talk to their friends. These habits can bleed into other standardized tests, and that creates a dangerous cycle.


